In connection with the 1953 Competition for the Most Improved Departmental Residences, D.R. 3655, occupied by Guard E.A. Vernon, was awarded first prize of £6.5.0 for places with piped water supply in the Sale Works Foroman's section.

ADDITIONAL SIDING ACCOMMODATION:

5.

On 7.10.54 the Chief Traffic Manager imformed the Commissioners that there has been a new development at Orbost in that up to 10 trucks of pulpwood are now being loaded daily for the Australian Paper Manufacturers, Maryvale, and whilst the timber traffic has not varied to any extent and has been efficiently handled by two motorised cranes, the sleeper traffic is on the increase and the siding facilities are now inadequate for the handling of the volume of traffic offering.

Increased wool and maize traffic is now offering, and the yard is regularly congested and difficult to work because of the inadequacy of the accommodation.

The Chief Traffic Manager has recommended that a plan (No.83/48) accepted on 20.6.50 by the Commissioners as a scheme of improved accommodation be now approved and the work put in hand early.

On 12.2.54 Mr. J. Douthat made application to motorise the 6-tons crane at the down end of the yard and load timber with it as is done at the other two motorised cranes.

CHARGES FOR LOADING TIMBER WITH CRANES:

Alstergren Pty.Ltd. and Mr. J.F.McMahon load timber with two railway 6 tons cranes on which they installed power drives some years ago. Each loader makes the following charges for loading timber into rail trucks: -

(a) 10d. per 100 super. feet of timber when loaded from road vehicle direct to railway truck.

RESTORATION OF WATT'S GULCH BANK:

The Snowy River Improvement Trust has long range proposals under consideration for improving the Snowy River and one of these is the sealing off of Watt's Gulch to prevent ever-flow from the River during floods. The estimated cost of this work is between £4000 and £6000 and the Trust requested that this Department contribute one third of this cost because of benefits which would be derived by the railways from such sealing.

STRENGTHENING OF LINE:

The Greater Gippsland and Snowy River Protection and General Devolopment League made representations in May 1951 to the Hon. the Minister for Public Works that the Bairnsdale-Orbost line be strengthened.

On 26.4.51 the Chairman of Commissioners reported as follows to the Hon. the Minister: -

"The Bairnsdale-Orbost line is 60 miles long, and in common with many other branch lines throughout the State is laid with light rails and with bridges suitable for the types of locomotives used on light lines. To strengthen the Orbest line for use by heavy engines would involve extensive rebuilding of bridges, widening cuttings and embankments and relaying the track with heavier rails. This would involve an expenditure of upwards of a million poinds, and, as the existing track is quite capable of handling all the traffic offering on the line, this would obviously not be justified.*

CRANE:

16.

Early in 1952, Messrs. Gibbs Bright and Coy. purchased on behalf of the Waygara Sawmilling Coy, the Departmental 6-tons crane at Waygara which was transferred there from Noojee. The total price paid was £505 representing £350 as the value of the crane and £155 as cost of its erection at Waygara by this Department.

On 10.11.52 Gibbs Bright and Coy, stated that the Waygara Sawmilling Coy. finds that it does not require the crane any longer as it has made more satisfactory arrangements and asks that the Department buy the crane back for the price paid, viz. £505.

On 23.12.54 the Secretary for Railways advised Gibbs Bright & Coy. that the value of the crane to this Department is £350 but, if purchased, it would require to be dismantled for use elsewhere. This work is estimated to cost £100, and the Commissioners were prepared to purchase the crane from the Company for the sum of £250.

ALTERATIONS TO STOCK YARDS:

35.

On tour at Bruthen on 11/12/51 representatives of the Shire of Tambo interviewed the Commissioners regarding these yards. The deputation stated that in wet weather it is impossible to drive a motor vehicle in to unload pigs. It is only a dirt track and request was made that a road be formed and gravelled and the fences on each side of the roadway to the yards be given attention as they are not stock proof.

The deputation was informed that it was proposed to move the unloading ramp to a more suitable position facing the end of the stock lane where transports would have no difficulty in turning. Arrangements would be made for the fences to be put in order but the Commissioners could not agree to provide a road as stock could be unloaded at the ramp and driven to

The Council anticipated that a local water supply scheme would be in operation in about 12 months' time and requested that the water supply be extended to the trucking yards.

It was explained that it is the Department's policy where there is a reticulated water supply and a reasonable amount of traffic to provide watering facilities at the trucking yards.

The fences were repaired and on 14/8/52 the Chief Civil Engineer reported that the proposed renewal of the yards had been listed for attention as soon as circumstances permit.

On 1/6/53 the Shire of Tambo wrote saying that "owing to the state of disrepair of the yards owners are forced to transport stock to Bairnsdale and unless prompt action is taken to effect urgent improvements required the position will be serious".

COST OF GAS AT PRECUT HOUSES:

68.

On tour on 14.10.53 all tenants occupying pre-cut houses at Bairnsdale complained of the high cost of gas (up to £12 per month and averaging £10) which they attributed to the high unit charge, its poor calorific value and its utilisation for water heating.

A statement was obtained from the Colonial Gas
Association showing the monthly charges at each of the five
precut houses at Bairnsdale for the 12 months ended September
1953. This disclosed that the highest charges were in June
and July, 1953, for £7 and £6.14.10d. respectively at the
residence occupied by Fireman Colliver. The average monthly
charge per house was slightly over £4 but, taking into consideration the high cost of gas at Bairnsdale (29/3 for the first
2,000 cubic feet) the charges were considered reasonable.

After investigation the Secretary for Railways replied on 3.4.52 that "having regard to the sharp angle (approximately 20 degrees) of the roadway to the railway at this location adoption of your Council's suggestion to relocate the cattle pits in line with the edge of the road reserve would be contrary to the interests of safety and as it is considered that the present width of the roadway is adequate, my Commissioners regret they cannot see their way to accede to the request".

It is the Department's policy to equip all locomotives on running lines with electric headlights, and work on the few engines remaining to be fitted will be done as early as practicable.

The question of fitting reflectors to the sides of railway rolling stock has previously been considered but owing to various factors, my Commissioners cannot see their way to sanction their use. The principal disability is that in station grounds and yards where there are curved lines they could be mistaken by shunting staff and train crews for fixed and/or hand signals.

The Commissioners are satisfied that with the exercise of ordinary care and observance of traffic regulations no danger should be apprehended by roadusers at level crossings.

As indicated in the press it is proposed shortly to crect stop signs at a large number of level crossings, and as it will then be obligatory on roadusers to stop before passing over the crossing this should ensure a greater measure of safety at such erossings".

The Chief Civil Engineer reported on 30.11.53 that the statement that gas bills averaged £5 per month was exaggerated and the average monthly cost at Traralgon does not compare unfavorably with the cost at pre-cut houses at Bairnsdale and Seymour.

The Commissioners approved on 3.12.53 of the recommendation of the Chief Civil Engineer that the gas stoves, coppers and hot water services installed in the pre-cut houses erected at Traralgon remain and not be replaced by electric units.

In March 1954 the Traralgon Sub-Branch of the A.R.U. requested per the Hon. the Minister that electric stoves, coppers and hot water services be installed in lieu of gas units in the further 6 pre-cut houses proposed for erection in Traralgon.

On 18.5.54 the Commissioners wrote the Hon, the Minister as follows:— "The Commissioners desire to say that they have approved of the installation of electric hot water services in further pre-cut houses to be erected at Traralgon because of the cheaper night tariff available for electric hot water services, and the most costly maintenance required for gas appliances of this type.

As the operating and maintenance costs of electric and gas stoves and coppers are comparable, it is not proposed, however, to alter the existing practice of installing gas units for these services."

REARRANGEMENT OF YARD AND PASSENGER AND GOODS FACILITIES:

A much larger station is to be provided on the present site and the goods yard and stock trucking facilities are to be removed to a site adjacent to the Maryvale railway siding and situated east of the new Jerralang West road deviation approximately 2½ miles from Morwell and 6 miles from Traralgon.

Because of urgent need for additional loading space in the present goods yard approval has been given for the relocation of the water tank at the down end and the extension and straightening of the long dead-end siding with metalling of the frontage to it.

Included in the proposals is the construction of a 50° wide bridge at the up end and a 100° wide bridge at the down end, pedestrian subway, new station buildings, platform, goods shed, stock yards and gantry crane etc. the cost of which in 1949 was estimated at £350,000. The pedestrian subway under the line at the main station will be extended across beneath the Princes Highway to the opposite side of the road and a request from residents that the level crossing at the down end be retained when the overhead bridge has been constructed at McDonald Street has been refused. The work on the subway and bridges is well in hand.

Re-arrangement of the station yard is proceeding. The principal works being carried out at this stage are:-

- (a) construction of pedestrian subway (to join with Council subway under Prince's Highway)
- (b) Reconstruction of bridge at Jane Street; and (c) Construction of bridge at McDonald Street.

The PCR crossing at Church Street is to be closed.

SITE FOR COMFORT STATION AND AREA FOR BEAUTIFICATION.

The area was inspected in company with the Council representatives who pointed out the dilapidated appearance of the building on the leased site and requested that the lease be terminated, the building removed and the whole area made available to the Council.

The Commissioners pointed out that the area may have considerable value as business sites; that it was their duty to obtain the best return from land that may not be immediately required for railway purposes and that the Council would be advised as soon as possible of the Department's intentions in the matter.

The unsightly building referred to in item (2) was removed off the land in question some time ago.

The Chief Civil Engineer reported on 30.8.54 that several inquiries have been received for leasing railway land at Morwell for business purposes. The railway land with frontages to the Main Street and the Princes Highway is highly valuable for business purposes and, until a decision as to the final layout for duplication and other departmental requirements has been reached, it will not be possible to decide what further land is available for leasing.

ABATTOIRS SITE.

At discussions between the abovementioned Committee and railway officers it was arranged that a site in allotments 16 and 17 to the east of Tramway Road and adjacent to the railway on the south side should be set aside for abattoirs, sale-yards and railway stock trucking yards, and it was so arranged in the Latrobe Valley Sub-Regional Planning Scheme 1949.

The Victorian Inland Meat Authority has recommended the acceptance of a site for abattoirs in allotment 84 which is about two miles north of the main Gippsland railway and east of the siding loading to the A.P.M. works. The A.P.M. are reluctant to allow their busy line to be used for serving other industrial areas and it is considered that an additional siding leaving the main line near Maryvale sidings and parallel with the existing A.P.M. line would be necessary to serve the abattoirs if they were established in allotment 84.

An additional expenditure of about £70,000 would be required for such a line. The cost of this line and any sidings at the works, together with a charge for maintenance, would require to be met by the authority operating the abattoirs. In addition, placing charges for railway trucks used in the service would be imposed. The cost of operating rail sidings for stock traffic will be much less if the abattoirs site be on allotments 16 and 17 than if on allotment 84.

It is desirable that facilities for rail stock trucking, sale yards and abattoirs should be in close proximity to each other and the approved site on allotments 16 and 17 is preferable from a railway point of view.

The matter was discussed in 1952 with Messrs. Oakley and Parkes, Architects for the Inland Meat Authority and advice from them is awaited.

"I desire to say that the congested and somewhat untidy appearance of the railway yard at Moe is due largely to the presence of portable buildings for railway employes who are engaged on extensive works in the area. Instructions are being issued with a view to ensuring that the yard is maintained in as clean and tidy a condition as the present emergency circumstances permit. The grass in the yard is regularly burned off in season and arrangements have been made with the Lands Department for the eradication of the blackberries."

On 16.6.54 the Chamber of Commerse again wrote saying "We feel that even though the yards may be clear of rubbish, etc. they will always be an eyesore. It would appear that the only solution is to hide the yards altogether with, perhaps a hedge. The members feel that although the appearance of the goods shed has improved recently it could be improved quite a lot more with a coat of paint. It is also considered that pig-face, or something similar would improve the appearance of the stark cuttings on the east side of the main overhead bridge".

On 5.8.54 the Chairman wrote the Chamber of Commerce as follows:— "I desire to say that plans for the re-arrangement of this yard include the replacement of the existing goods shed by a new structure on another site. In the circumstances we would not be justified in repainting the existing shed, but, as previously stated instructions have been issued with a view to ensuring that the yard is maintained in a clean and tidy condition'

Mr. Stoddart stated that he was positive that a drain at this point was necessary and it did not appear that it was to be provided.

On 7.7.54 the Chairman informed the Hon. the Minister:"The Commissioners desire to say that there is a 2°3" diameter pipe
drain under the Princes Highway at 71 m. 5 ch. near Trafalgar (in
front of Mr. Roach's property) and the request is for the
provision of a pipe under the railway track at this location.

A stream passes under the roadway and railway tracks approximately 10 chains on the 'down' side of the pipe drain and in the normal course water from this drain should flow along the roadway side drain to the stream. The latter drain at present requires to be cleaned out.

In the course of earthworks being carried out in connection with the duplication of the line the railway side drain to the stream will be excavated sufficiently to take all water passing through the pipe drain under normal conditions. Mr. Roach's property is situated in the lowest part of the surrounding area and although flooding has occurred due to the limited waterway under the road, the waterway under the railway track has proved adequate and, in the circumstances, the Commissioners cannot see their way to install a pipe under the railway track at the point desired".

On 19.11.53 the Acting Mechanical Engineer reported that the "existing accommodation (25 beds) at Warragul barracks is required to meet present needs and if the V.I.A. huts are to be removed it will be necessary to replace them with other portables.

Action has been taken to ensure that the required standard of cleanliness of food lockers and ablution, latrine and kitchen blocks is maintained."

The Acting Chief Mechanical Engineer subsequently submitted requests from the occupants of the barracks that a recreation hall be provided and it was suggested that four V.I.A. huts be used for that purpose.

The Chief Civil Engineer reported on 1.3.54 that the four V.I.A. huts were not suitable for conversion to one large recreation hut but they could be repaired and made suitable for sleeping quarters and instructions had been issued accordingly.

On 12.4.54 the Commissioners approved of provision of a recreational hut 24' x 14' at an estimated cost of £800; a "Sun Glow" sawdust burning stove to be installed at one end.

(3) Stock crossings which formerly existed over the line on the down side of the station be re-opened.

The deputation was informed that it was understood that the matter had previously been investigated, and that in connection with the final plans the crossings had been abolished. The matter would, however, be investigated and the Council advised of the decision.

(4) An oak tree on railway land at the up end of the station be removed. It was stated that the tree sheds its leaves over the croquet lawns which it also shades.

It was promised the matter would be looked into.

On 23.12.53 the Shire Council was advised:-

- (1) The crossings in question are at Nilma and Yarragon. Both have been sealed, but it was necessary to open the former crossing due to settling of the track. This will be resealed at an early date.
- (2) It is understood that the road has never been used as such. It was an unmade Government Road leased to the adjoining owners for grazing purposes, and certain portions were closed by this Department under the powers conferred by the Gippsland Railway (Duplication and Regrading) Act 1948 and included in the railway boundaries. There is no obligation on the Commissioners to make available for road traffic any part of the road included in the railway boundaries or to provide a road diversion in lieu thereof.
- (3) We have no record of the existence of these crossings and aerial photographs taken prior to duplication shown that no such crossings existed between Warragul and Nilma. During the early stages of the duplication work, the architects who were acting as town planners to your Shire enquired as to the possibility of providing a crossing near the locomotive depot but the matter was not pursued. There are no bridges on this section which could be used for stock crossings.
- (4) The oak tree on railway land at the west end of the station has been removed."

On 31/3/52 the Secretary for Railways replied to the Progress Association:

"With regard to the level crossings at both ends of the station yard, the matter has been investigated by our Level Crossing Committee which advises that the flashing light signal protection at the Main Street crossing will be retained under the duplication proposals, i.e. two pairs of flashing lenses on each standard, on both sides of the crossing, will be retained and focused to given adequate warning indication of trains to readusers approaching from either direction from Main Street and/or along the reads paralleling the railway enclosure.

Proposals as regards the crossing at the opposite end of the yard provide for the removal and re-erection elsewhere of the departmental residence now located at the southcast corner of the crossing, the erection of an additional crossing sign at the north east corner and the acquisition of triangular areas of land at the north east, south east and southwest corners of the crossing in order to ensure that adequate views of trains will be detained by readusers when approaching the crossing from any direction. It is considered that these safeguards will afford adequate protection for readusers and that the provision of subways or everhead bridges is not warranted.

On 10/4/52 the Progress Association informed the Berwick Shire Council that, in connection with the reply from the Railways (as set out above), it was of the opinion that the Main Street crossing fully warrants gates because of the restricted vision and asked that "the Council give serious consideration to asking the Victorian Railways for gates to be installed at this dangerous crossing". The Council accordingly referred the matter to this Department for consideration.

The Level Crossing Committee recommended that the Council be given a reply similar to that given the Progress Association on 31/3/52 and informed that the provision of gates at Main Street crossing is declined.

FLOOD LIGHTS AT CRUSSING:
