BOOKING OF PASSENGERS FOR YARRAM LINE.

2.

On tour on 17th February, 1959 the Shire Secretary of the Shire of Alberton requested that tickets for the Yarram line be available for purchase at Princes Bridge as this station is now being used to an increasing extent being nearer to No.1 East platform. It was promised that the matter would be looked into.

Following investigation of the request the Secretary on 8th April, 1959, wrote as under:-

"Printed tickets for a number of stations on the Leongatha and Wonthaggi lines were supplied to Princes Bridge commencing on Sunday 1st February, following the introduction of the 7.10pm Sunday Service from Melbourne to Leongatha and Wonthaggi, which departs from No.1 East Platform, instead of the former Sunday morning service to those stations. In addition, blank ticket books are also available to enable the Princes Bridge booking staff to issue hand written tickets to other stations on the south-eastern line, including Yarram

It is found, however, that only a limited number of country bookings are effected at Princes Bridge, and in the circumstances the Commissioners would not be warranted in duplicating at that station the booking and luggage facilities now available at the centre entrance to No.1 platform, Flinders

Mr. A. T. Vardy stated that the railway fences alongside his

obligation to maintain fencing to that line but did so for its
own purposes. Owing to the state of Railway finances it was not
practicable for the fences to be attended to just then but there
would be no objection to Mr. Vardy himself using any materials
in the fences to keep them in a state of repair.

On 27/2/58 Honorable R.W.May M.L.C. telephoned the Commissioners regarding alleged discrimination in the fencing of railway boundaries in the Gelliondale-Albert River-Alberton area. The Secretary for Railways wrote to Honorable R.W.May on 2/5/58 as follows:-

"I desire to say that the fencing at this and other locations in the district needs renewal, and arrangements are being made for the work to be carried out as early as practicable in priority according to the condition of the fencing."

Tenders for the renewal of this fencing have been invited on (3) occasions, twice without response and finally at a quotation considered to be too high.

Mr. Vardy was contacted and advised that there was insufficient Departmental labour to carry out the work. He indicated that he would erect fences himself with no labour costs to the Department.

With reference to the attached letter, the Commissioners have to report that electric lighting is provided at Korumburra, Leongatha Fish Creek, Foster, Toora and Yarram, whilst a kerosene lamp in the vicinity of the barrier gate is lit at Meeniyan Stony Creek, Buffalo, Welshpool, Hedley, Gelliondale and Alberton prior to ceasing duty at 5. 0 p.m. and extinguished by the guard of the 6.12 pm passenger train from Melbourne to Yarram. YAPRAM - KOONWARRA

LIGHTING OF STATIONS (Contd.)

Arrangements are in hand for the provision of electric lighting at Meeniyan.

The remaining stations, Koonwarra, Tarwin, Hoddle and Bennison, where the passenger traffic is extremely light, are equipped with a kerosene lamp which is lit by passengers desiring to board the evening train from Melbourne. Similar provision is made at other country stations where the traffic is insufficient to justify lighting on a regular basis for the arrival of evening passenger trains.

The two guards stationed at Yarram regularly work the evening passenger train from Melbourne, and both these employes state that they keep passengers informed of their whereabouts by frequent announcements. However, in view of the within complaint, they have been specially reminded of the necessity to pay strict attention of this aspect of their duties."

APPROACH ROADS AND TRUCKING YARDS

20.

At Gelliondale on tour on 24th July, 1956 the Commissioners were met by Messrs. A.P. Moore and G.A. Morgan who requested that:

- (a) the approach road on the goods side by improved. During the minter months the approach is very soft and trucks bringing in pigs to the unloading ramp are liable to bog down. Difficulty is also experienced in taking delivery of truck loads of pollard, etc.
- (b) the road approach to the trucking yards be improved.

It was stated that the Sbire road leading to the trucking yards is very wet and difficult to negotiate.

(c) That some filling be provided in the trucking yards.

The Commissioners pointed out that they were not responsible for the maintenance of the Spire road but they proposed to spread some gravel to improve conditions between the road formation and the neavy duty ramp. (Contd.)

ELECTRIC LIGHTING

24.

Requests have been made on several occasions for electric lighting to be installed, but as the requirements of the public are attended to mostly during daylight, and a Tilley lamp is provided for use in the office when necessary, the provision of electric lighting is not warranted and all requests have been refused - the latest being from Mrs. J. Pattinson Acting Secretary of the Country Women's Association of Victoria to whom the Chairman on 16/6/59 wrote as under:-

"With reference to your letter of 5th June, I have to advise that the question of installing electric lighting at Welshpool station has been under review previously.

In 1955 it was estimated that the cost would be in excess of £200, and frankly, the number of passengers three per trip on the average - alighting from the evening train to Yarram does not justify this expenditure, the kerosene light on the barrier gate being considered adequate.

Departmental policy is to provide lighting at all stations to a standard which reasonably meets local requirements and electric lighting is extended to stations as circumstances demand. There is still a number of locations on the Yarram line and elsewhere where such lighting is not warranted.

Guards and conductors are required under the regulations to call out distinctly the names of stations at which trains stop during the journey, and as a result of your letter the guards working on the Varram line have been reminded of their obligations in this regard."

TREE PLANTING COMPETITION.

34.

In the 1958 Tree Planting and Decoration of Stations competition Toora station was commended in the New Work without piped water supply section, in the Eastern District. Mr. L. Collett S.M. and Jnr. Stn. Asst. T. Campi were responsible for the work.

APPROACH ROAD TO TRUCKING YARDS.

35 .

At Toora on tour on 24th July, 1956 representations were made to the Commissioners by Councillor A. Lonsdale of the Shire of South Gippsland, in regard to the approach road to the trucking yards.

It was stated that, owing to the heavy traffic to and from British United Dairies, there is serious congestion when stock is driven to the trucking yards from the roadway at the 'down' end. There is a road half a chain wide at the 'Up' end leading towards the trucking yards which could be used for stock.

The Commissioners pointed out that the congestion was caused by the concentration of road traffic and they could not see their way to incur the expense that would be involved in providing the approach. The half chain roadway did not belong to the Department but appeared to be a Council road, and, if those concerned wished to use it as an approach to the trucking yards, it would be necessary for the Council the bear the cost.

However, if the Council submitted a proposition the Commissioners would be prepared to look into it.

The matter was referred to at Toora on tour on 11/2/58 by Mr. P. S. Morcom representing the local Progress Association. He was informed that the proposed roadway was not required for railway purposes and the Commissioners were not prepared to incur any expense in connection with the provision of such means of access to the trucking yards. If the local Council was willing to construct and maintain a roadway at its own cost they would be glad to consider such a proposition.

Mr. Morcom indicated that he would take the matter up with the Council.

BULK LOADING RACES.

44.

At Foster on tour on 11th February, 1958 representations were made to the Commissioners by Mr. D. Heaton-Harris of the Australian Estates Agency Company, that double bulk loading races be provided at the local trucking yards. It was stated that new sale yards have been established by the Australian Estates Agency Company and a substantial increase in traffic was expected.

The Commissioners explained that double bulk loading races are provided only where truckings of sheep average not less that 250 trucks per annum. At Foster, however, the truckings were only about 100 trucks annually, and they were not prepared to put in the required facility at present but in the event of a substantial increase in truckings the matter would be reviewed.

Review in October, 1958 showed that trucks of livestock from this station from the beginning of the year had comprised 73 sheep, 46 cattle and 48 pigs, insufficient to justify the desired provision.

On tour on 12/7/59 Councillors A. Linton (President) and J.H.McDonald, and the Secretary of the Shire of South Gippsland and Mr. W. Davies again requested that double bulk races be provided at the trucking yards. They considered that the provision of the desired facility would result in an increase of traffic by diversion from road transport.

The Commissioners informed them that the number of trucks of sheep forwarded from Foster in recent years fell far short of the number laid down as justifying the provision of double bulk races. However, if outward truckings increased to 150 trucks a year, double races would be provided.

FENCING

45.

On 15/6/56, the Australian Primary Producers' Union complained of the very bad state of repair of some of the railway fences in the Foster area and the Secretary for Railways replied as under on 27/11/56:-

"With reference to your letter of 15th June, the fencing of the railway land between Hoddle and Foster has been inspected, and approximately 2 miles requires renewal, and repairs are necessary to other sections.

Departmental staff is not available to carry out the work and the necessary material is on hand, but we have been unsuccessful in obtaining contractors to do the work. We are, however, again inviting tenders with a view to having the remains and renewals effected as early as practicable.

I might mention that the Commissioners are not obliged to maintain the fences, but they do so for their own purposes. The legal responsibility for renairs to the fencing in question rests with the adjoining landholders, and they might co-operate by submitting tenders for the work."

However, in view of the heavy rainfall in this area, a scheme was prepared for concreting the sheep crush yards and providing a concrete lined drain between the crushes and the holding yards.

The matter was mentioned at Fish Creek on tour on 24/7/56 when Cr. W. Cale of the Shire of South Gippsland and Messrs. Ryan and Kerr were informed by the Commissioners that the sheep crushing yards and race would be surfaced in concrete and the pitchers re-set in the cattle race.

In reply to a deputation which met them at Fish Creek on 11.2.58 the Commissioners promised that the work of concreting the sheep crush yards and race and the resetting of pitches in the cattle race, would be put in hand in April and this work has since been completed.

Further requests have been made by the Intercontinental Packers Pty. Ltd., and Gippsland and Northern Co-operative Co. Ltd. for :-

(a) Extension of the roofing of the pig shelter.
(b) Provision of an adjustable transport ramp.
(c) Relocation of the tank and water trough.
(d) Erection of holding yards between pig yard and

Gippsland and Northern Yards.

(e) Provision of gateway giving access direct from the Gippsland and Northern Yards to the trucking yards.

The Commissioners agreed to attend to items (a) and (e) and the work was completed on 19/5/59.

With regard to items (b) (c) and (d) the Company, in letter dated 16/3/59, agreed to carry out the work involved in this regard.

ELECTRIC LIGHTING

61.

Several previous requests for provision of electric lighting at this location have been declined.

However, on tour on 17/2/59 Mr. Fitzgerald, Dumbalk Co-operative Butter & Cheese Coy.Ltd. informed the Commissioners he was prepared to extend electric supply to the station free of charge. The Commissioners accepted the offer and agreed to carry out the balance of the work.

In connection with the 1958 Competition for the Most Improved Departmental Residences D.R.4046 occupied by Goods Checker W. Pollock, Leongatha was awarded 1st prize of 67.0.0 for the Most Improved Pesidence with piped water supply, in the Korumburra Works Foreman's section.

PASSENGER APPROACH ROAD.

74.

At Leongatha on tour on 24/7/56 representations were made by Cr. C.A. Bond, of the Shire of Woorayl that the approach road to the passenger platform was in poor condition and it was suggested that it be sealed.

The Commissioners pointed out that it had been recently repaired and was in good condition. Observations indicated that it was also used by road traffic which did not stop at the station. In the circumstances and in view of the shortage of funds for work of this nature, they were unable to undertake the work.

Councillor Mc Indoe of the Shire of Woorayl interviewed the Chief Civil Engineer on this subject on 13/5/57 and stated that the Council would co-operate in reshaping and sealing the road. When it was pointed out to him that it was not then the time of the year for sealing, Cr. McIndoe said he thought that if the matter was discussed then the work, if necessary, could be programmed for sealing in February or March, 1958.

The Commissioners inspected this roadway whilst on tour in 1958 and found it to be in good condition. No reference to sealing was made at that time by representatives of the Shire.

On 8/10/59 Councillor McIndoe called on the Actg. Asst.Chief Civil Engineer to discuss proposal from the Council. He said the Council would provide labour and plant and maintain the road in future and bear cost of these items. The Pailway Department to supply sealing material and bear cost of these. The Council might alternatively provide the material at the Department's cost. He intimated a letter would be sent to the Department on the above lines, but nothing further has been heard of this matter.

FOOTWAY ON DOWN SIDE OF OVERHEAD BRIDGE AND VIEW NEAR ENGINE SHED:

The Shire of Korumburra has made repeated requests for the provision of a footway on the Down side of the overhead bridge when it is being reconstructed.

LEVEL CROSSING AT 66M. 47CH. (WHITELAW).

96.

As a result of investigation by the Level Crossing Committee in 1945, approval was given for the abolition of D.R.365 and the provision of cattle pits, with flashing light signals, at the level crossing at 88M. 47CHS.

It was subsequently ascertained that the road over this crossing was the regular stock route and that stock drowing was prohibited along the adjacent main road, and in view of this, it was decided in 1946 that the installation of flashing light signals would be unsuitable and that, instead, a 20' wide overhead bridge be constructed some distance in the down direction in lieu of the existing crossing. However, the local Council was not prepared to assist with the necessary road formation in connection with the bridge, as it was considered the bridge would not be warranted when the Country Roads Board constructed the South Gippsland Highway on the opposite side of the line between Bena and Korumburra, which was approved by the Board in 1948.

At Bena on tour on 28.4.55 representations were made to the Commissioners by a deputation from the local branch of the A.P.P.U. that the level crossing at 66M. 47CH. at Whitelaw be abolished when the South Gippsland Highway is reconstructed. The deputation said it was understood that the Country Roads Board proposed to construct the Highway between Bena and Korumburra and asked that when this was done an overhead bridge be provided in place of the existing crossing.

The deputation was informed that it was understood the Country Roads Board had abandoned the proposal, but that the matter would be again taken up with the Board with a view to ascertaining what it proposed to do.

On 24.5.55 the Secretary for Railways wrote Mr.S. Dooling of Bena (member of the deputation on 28.4.55) as follows:- "I desire to say that enquiries from the Country Roads Board confirm the intimation made by my Commissioners at the time that the Board does not intend at present to proceed with the proposal to deviate the South Gippsland Highway from the north to the south of the railway line between the level crossing at 65M. 79CH.and 68M. 36CH.

It is understood that reconstruction of certain sections of the highway on the present northern alignment is to be undertaken by the Board, but until such time as it becomes necessary to replace the existing gate-house at Whitelaw, my Commissioners regret they cannot see their way to accede to the request that the existing crossing be replaced by an overhead bridge. A warning bell to advise the gatekeeper of the approach of 'up' trains is at present being installed".

The installation of warning bell has been pended as a result of the Country Roads Board having commenced operations on new highway.

APPROACH ROAD.

CLOSURE OF STATION.

Because of the very limited traffic at Jeetho in recent years the Commissioners following last year's tour of inspection of the South Eastern line, called for reports as to the justification for the retention of the station and in July, 1959 they advised the Minister of their intention to close the station to all traffic.

Subsequently representations were made to the Minister by the Australian Primary Producers Union and Australian Dairy Producers Union protesting against the Commissioners' intention but on 4/1/60 the Chairman, after considering the representations made, advised the Minister that the Commissioners considered that they would not be warranted in varying their previous recommendation and the approval of the Minister for the closure of the station is awaited.

On 23.5.55 a letter was received from the Country Roads Board referring to this matter, and advising the estimated cost of regrading the crossing (£400) and the estimated cost of construction of a suitable underpass (£3,500) and requesting advice as to this Department's contribution to the cost.

In response to a recent request from the Country Roads Board the latter was informed that provided the existing P.C.R. were closed this Department's contribution would be approximately £500.

The Chairman of the Inter Departmental Level Crossing Committee has intimated that conditions at this crossing are such that it would have a very low priority in any grade separation programme."

The Country Road Board was similarly advised on 21.6.55.

Arising out of representations made to the Commissioners on tour on 25/7/56 and advice that the Council was anxious to proceed with the work, the Commissioners agreed to the Department's contribution being increased to £750 and in response to its request for an up-to-date estimate of the cost of providing the underpass the Shire of Korumburra was advised on 16/11/56 that the figure was then £9.350.

Replacement of the open P.C.R. crossing at Yann's Road 57M. 42C. between Nyora and Woodleigh by an underpass structure was raised by the Shire with the Minister for Public Works in June, 1957.

After discussion it was agreed that the road, which is a Shire responsibility, carries only very light traffic and that there was no justification for according it any priority or the use of Level Crossing Funds for the purpose.

On Tour on 19th February, 1959 request was made to the Commissioners by Councillor H.L. Brunt and the Secretary of the Shire of Cranbourne for the 8.4 a.m. up train to run to an earlier schedule so that people working in Cranbourne and Dandenong could travel by rail from Cranbourne instead of having to travel to Dandenong by road and thence by train.
